



Winnie and Honey - School Dog Risk Assessment

Introduction:

Current research is suggesting that a 'companion' animal in school can make a difference to the wellbeing of both staff and pupils. With this in mind, Woodlands Primary School has become the daytime home for Winnie and Honey, female cockapoos.

In order for them both to be successfully and safely integrated into the life of the school, a risk assessment has been undertaken and is outlined below. The safety of children and the dogs is paramount. We must also ensure that a dog in school can have as natural a life as possible while in the school building.



















The following precautions have been undertaken:

- 1. Research into the most appropriate breed indicates that cockapoos are well suited to working and playing with children.
- 3. The dogs are regularly groomed and checked for any infections or illnesses.
- 4. Visits to the vet take place regularly and they will have all necessary inoculations.
- 5. The dogs are wormed every three-six months.
- 6. Their claws are trimmed to reduce the risk of scratching.
- 7. They will have plenty of exercise and will always be physically or mentally exercised before working with children.
- 8. Winnie and Honey have appropriate insurance, including liability insurance (certificate can be viewed at school admin office)
- 9. The dogs have had significant socialisation experiences in order to make sure they enjoys their time at Woodlands.
- 10. Health and Hygiene routines have been established for both Winnie and Honey and the children to follow whilst in school.

Winnie and Honey have undertaken puppy training classes from a reputable training company. Work is also being undertaken to ensure that our children know how to approach dogs and how to behave when dogs are around.

Miss Crilly will continue and reinforce this training on a daily basis with both dogs.



















The dogs live with Miss Crilly when not at school and she will ensure that they are healthy and fit to be in school at all times. They are registered with a vet in Broseley and are up to date (and will be kept up to date) with immunisations and worming.

We appreciate that not all families and children are comfortable with dogs and will respect parental wishes for any child not to come into direct contact with either Winnie or Honey. Please notify the office if this is the case and there will be a form for you to sign.

The dogs will be on a lead when with children, except in controlled supervised circumstances.

Winnie and Honey will not be allowed to toilet anywhere on the playground area and any 'mess' will be cleaned up and safely disposed of with an appropriate cleaner.
